





Change of face

As most of you may be aware, at the AGM, Doug Green did not stand for re-election and Polly Ward and Barbara Kenyon were elected as Church Wardens. At a recent Council meeting, Assistant Wardens were also appointed to help at the various churches – they are Margaret Jelley (Puy de Serre), Keith Fowler (La Chapelle Achard) and Jo Collinson (La Chapelle Palluau)

Change of date

Caroline's departure date has been changed from 30th September 2016 to 3rd October 2016. This is so that she can officiate at the Harvest Festival at La Chapelle Palluau on Sunday 2nd October. This will, therefore, become her farewell service and you may like to note the date in your diaries

Safeguarding

I understand that there will be a mention of this issue elsewhere in 'Grapevine' so we will just address the issue from a practical point of view.

Last weekend, we nearly had to cancel the Sunday Club at Puy de Serre because of a scarcity of people with the necessary qualifications. In order to ensure that this (and our other services to vulnerable people) continues, we will be checking the qualifications of everyone involved.

We are also encouraging all Council members and as many church members as possible to complete the Level 1 on line course as well as those in the front line of work with children (such as Sunday Club) and adults (visits to homes or hospitals) for whom it is a requirement. This training and the DBS checks (Disclosure & Barring Service, formally CRB) are renewable every 3 years. We have to raise awareness in all congregation members of safeguarding issues. If you wish to be added to this list, please remember to allow time for these things to become effective – police checks have never been quick!!!

The Archdeaconery of France Synod 2016 St Jacut de la Mer May 18th-21st

This year's theme was very topical "Migration" and we had some excellent speakers with solid reputations in their fields. We also had speakers from the Diocesan Office including Adrian Mumford the Diocesan Secretary and Ian Carter the Safeguarding Officer and Bishop David Hamid.

The Bible Study sessions were led by The Reverend Dr Richard Briggs who is the Lecturer in Old Testament and Director of Biblical Studies at Cranmer Hall in Durham and author of several books. He was an engaging speaker who brought the Old Testament to life and took us through Jonah and Daniel. One of the things he suggested was that often the Old Testament stories were concerned with 'us and them'. The Israelites in the story of Jonah had to consider the possibility of God calling all people, and it makes us think what do we really want God to do for other people and do we really want foreigners? Daniel was thrown suddenly into a situation and shows us that we can be thrown into unexpected, unwanted circumstances and makes us question how we and our faith could cope under pressure. But it also shows how constancy in prayer and immersion in God's word produces fruit in season.

We heard from two people working with the mass migration in Europe, looking at it from different perspectives. Max McClellan has a background in human rights law and policy and has worked in various places with the United Nations High Commission for Refugees. He is just back from Greece where he is currently working as a Consultant to the Anglican Church in Greece and was able to give us first hand accounts of the problems there and photographs of the people he met. He spoke of the lack of information for people and how, if able to be done legally, flights are much cheaper than being smuggled. There are also problems for some of the larger aid agencies because of legal definitions concerning refugees and migrants. There are still shortages in Greece, especially as they are struggling financially as a country and in the Detention Centres there is too little food and it is often sub-standard. The Anglican Church take in 400 meals once a week. Many churches and denominations are working together, for example the Salvation Army run a Day Centre and the Anglican Church has provided funds for an interpreter. The latest figures show that there are approximately 53,900 people stranded in Greece in temporary camps. It is often the most vulnerable who remain as the rich have managed to buy onward travel legally or illegally.

Doris Peschke has also been involved in racism and migration for many years. Since 1999 she has been General Secretary of the Churches' Commission for Migrants in Europe, an ecumenical agency engaged with migration, asylum and anti-racism. The World Council of Churches commissioned this agency and it is working with the concept of 'The other is my neighbour'. They do a lot of research so that accurate figures can show the real situation as it is felt that if numbers are exaggerated there is an increase in fear. This is not the worst migrant situation in Europe since WW2 but it is the worst global situation with many refugees in the Middle East, Asia and Africa. The major refugee hosting countries are: Lebanon, Jordan, Turkey and Kenya. It is felt that closing borders leads to more smuggling and that every refugee has the right to have their application fully examined although not necessarily granted. One of the catch 22 problems for people is that legally to be granted asylum you have to have arrived in the country, it is not possible to apply before. It is agreed that the process of integration can take years for some although others can



contribute to their new society much earlier, but as Christians and remembering Daniel's story we have to think; 'What would I feel like as a refugee?' and 'How would I like to be treated?'

Ecumenical work is especially important in our Diocese and we are often reliant on the hospitality of the Catholic churches and Protestant churches for places of worship. We heard from Pasteur Christian Krieger about the Reuilly Contact Group and its work and hopes for deeper ecumenical relations. We also heard about the work of French ARC (a mandated committee of Anglicans and Roman Catholics) from members of that group. There is a booklet produced in both French and English "O, Lord open our lips" (which is available as a PDF download as well in English) looking at the common usage of morning and evening liturgical prayer and encouraging the shared celebration of these services in ecumenical meetings. We also had the privilege of updates from Pasteur Jane Stranz (Fédération Protestante) and Père Emmanuel Gougaud.

Another important topic for us was input from the Diocesan Safeguarding Officer Ian Carter, a former police officer and then Safeguarding Officer for the Diocese of Chelmsford. He has a 2 year contract to help improve our policies, training and actions. This has become a very high priority for the Church of England and we will be audited by an external auditor at chaplaincy/parish level in 2017. The new clergy discipline measures will extend to Church Wardens who are now duty bound to uphold the Diocesan Safeguarding Policy. It is also putting an emphasis on congregational responsibility for safeguarding and we are to encourage as many members of the congregations as possible to do the on-line Level 1 safeguarding training. We are to remember that safeguarding is not just for children and young people but also for vulnerable adults. There will be a need for a renewal of police checks every 5 years and training every 3 years. A level 2 training is being developed and this will train trainers, we will have 4 in France. Although criminal activity will come under local laws, the Diocesan investigations and restrictions will apply if policy is breached. This will cover actions within church buildings, during church activities and/or involving church personnel. It was emphasised that we are all vulnerable not only to being the recipients of abuse but also to being charged with it and so our actions must be considered and thought through so that we are not open to charges. Protocol, policies and the Level 1 training can all be found on the Diocesan website. We have no option but to ensure that all policy, paperwork, checks and our actions comply. There is a lot of work ahead. We are all asked to co-operate as no excuses (eg not knowing, no Priest, incomplete paperwork) will not be acceptable. This is all being taken very seriously at all levels of the Church of England and vast budgets have been set aside.

Adrian Mumford (Diocesan Secretary) asked us to remember that any tax payer paying in sterling to our churches can apply for gift aid. He also reminded us of the availability of the European Anglican Magazine and told us the website for the Diocese is being updated and there should be easier navigation. The Yearbook (which has caused us so much trouble!) is being withdrawn, there will be a leaflet but all information will be on the website. He gave a vote of thanks to all Treasurers and told us that all contributions to the Common Fund were paid in full. Our Diocese has the smallest running costs of all the Dioceses in the Church of England despite the huge distances involved.

The Archdeacon, Ian Naylor, informed us he was retiring at the end of September and thanks were given to him. Bishop David also is changing his role within the Diocese and will no longer be lead Bishop for France, Bishop Robert is taking over that role, he was also thanked.

During the Eucharist on Friday Patrick Sturges was admitted as Reader and on St Alcuin's day we were told of the re-inauguration of the Chaplaincy of St Alcuin in Tours on Sunday 22nd May. The



worship 3 times a day was led by various people and it was thought provoking and of great blessing. As were the beautiful surroundings of L'Abbaye.

We had meetings of the Chapter of Clergy and of the Chapter of Laity, here are some of the topics discussed by the clergy! The training and development of Church Wardens was felt to be really important whether they were new to the job or had been in post for years (!); it is a dual listening role and a legal office. We also discussed the Prayer Diary, any on the ground experience of the use of the leaflet 'O Lord open our lips', the situations faced by colleagues in Paris, Calais and Dunkirk and heard a little more about our new colleagues. A proposal went to the whole Synod that, if passed would be sent to Diocesan Synod regarding Charitable help for clergy from UK charities. I'm sure there was more but the hour went very quickly!

It is so good to meet colleagues from all over France and Monaco, to catch up with their news to share experiences and to support one another. There were light hearted moments (and some dreadful jokes!) and serious discussion. I hope this brief report has done justice to it.

Do you pay French taxes?



If so, did you know that for every 100 euros that you give to our Church the taxman will reduce your tax bill by 60 euros thus a 100 euro donation will only cost you 40 euros (and you will be able to increase your donation!!!)

You simply need to make your donation in a recordable manner.

You can put your donation in numbered envelopes in the collection box, set up a standing order (virement) or send money to the planned giving officer (Mike Mylod) giving your name and address. At the end of the year your contributions will be totted up and a certificate issued. You enter this amount on your tax return (no need to send proof, just keep your certificate in case you are asked for it) and the taxman will reduce your tax bill by a figure

equal to 60% of your donations.

Donations to the vicarage renovation can also qualify for tax relief if made through A S V.

Richard et Marian Rackham, ressortissants britanniques vivant dans la commune, ont ouvert leurs portes pour une vente de charité, samedi. Une occasion d'échanger avec nos amis anglais.

Richard, secrétaire du concile paroissial de l'Église anglicane en Vendée, et Marian Rackham, tous deux ressortissants britanniques, ont ouvert leur maison, samedi 30 mai, comme chaque année, pour une vente de charité au profit de l'Église anglicane. C'est l'occasion de rencontres et de discussions avec nos amis anglais sur leur façon de vivre, leurs problèmes, leurs préoccupations.

Brexit or not Brexit

Parmi celles-ci, la question du « Brexit », référendum sur la sortie éventuelle de la Grande-Bretagne de l'Union européenne. La grande majorité des Britanniques présents dans la région souhaitent rester Européens. Ils craignent, en cas de « non » au référendum, une évolution défavorable de leurs gévenus : taux de change, sécurité sociale, régime d'imposition. De plus, la plupart souhaitent également rester en France, même si la Grande-Bretagne devait s'éloigner de l'Europe. Pour eux, l'idéal serait que la Grande-Bretagne adopte l'euro, ce qui assurerait une stabilité de leurs revenus, indépendamment de la situation internationale.

On constate une légère érosion du nombre de ressortissants britanniques dans la région. Les jeunes retraités sont arrivés en France il y a une vingtaine d'années et aujourd'hui, la moyenne d'âge a augmenté. Quelques décès sont survenus. Par ailleurs, les problèmes de communication et de rapprochement familial font qu'il est plus facile, par exemple, de soigner la maladie d'Alzheimer dans leur pays natal qu'en France.

En revanche, nos amis britanniques sont toujours amoureux de notre « French way of life » (mode de vie français). Ils préfèrent le système de santé français au système britannique. Ils ont souvent acheté une vieille maison, l'ont rénovée avec soin et ont dépensé beaucoup d'argent. Malheureusement, le marché immobilier n'étant plus favorable, ceux qui vendent aujourd'hui le font à perte. Il y a quelques nouveaux arrivants anglais qui compensent partiellement les départs.

Pour Caroline Sacley, prêtre responsable du secteur vendéen depuis deux ans, « 2015 aura été l'année de mon installation et de l'aménagement de mon presbytère, à Saint-Vincent-Sterlange. Le fonctionnement des messes dominicales a trouvé son rythme de croisière ». Elle se réjouit de voir de nombreux Français participer au Coffee morning. C'est la preuve de l'assimilation de la communauté britannique.

Comme l'année dernière, 200 personnes sont venues prendre un café, ce matin-là, chez Marian et Richard. De nombreux articles étaient mis en ventes : bibelots, livres, petit mobilier, gâteaux, plantes vertes et des bijoux artisanaux ; des jeux étaient organisés. Et près de 2 000 € auront été recueillis. C'est plus qu'en 2015.



Teach us to pray... The 5-Finger Prayer



1. Your thumb is nearest you. So begin your prayers by praying for those closest to you. They are the easiest to remember. To pray for our loved ones is, as C.S. Lewis once said, a 'sweet duty'.




2. The next finger is the pointing finger. Pray for those who teach, instruct and heal. This includes teachers, doctors, nurses and ministers. They need support and wisdom in pointing others in the right direction. Keep them in your prayers.

3. The next finger is the tallest finger. It reminds us of our leaders. Pray for the government, leaders in business and industry, and administrators. These people shape our nations and guide public opinion. They need God's guidance.

4. The fourth finger is our ring finger. Surprising to many is the fact that this is our weakest finger; as any piano teacher will testify. It should remind us to pray for those who are weak, in trouble or in pain. They need your prayers day and night. You cannot pray too much for them.

5. And lastly comes our little finger; the smallest finger of all which is where we should place ourselves in relation to God and others. Your little finger should remind you to pray for yourself. By the time you have prayed for the other four groups, your own needs will be put into proper perspective and you will be able to pray for yourself more effectively.



'BREXIT'
