Just out of curiosity, I Googled "political unrest". You will probably not be surprised at the outcome: *About 84,100,000 results (0.38 seconds).* Almost every situation is marred by protests, a snapshot of the last week included:

An attack on the Japanese Prime Minister. A coup in Sudan. Widespread strikes in France. The ongoing war against Ukraine. China's belligerency towards Taiwan. Dozens killed and wounded in Myanmar military air attacks..... to name but a few. What has brought this on, you may wonder?

Martin and I joined one of our daughters and her partner, in a two night visit to the Menin Gate, Ieper in Belgium, it turned into three, thanks to the SNCF strike, there's nothing like an unplanned 24 hour stop over to focus the mind. Stuck in an hotel room for 18 hours in Lille, gives one time to think.

To try to get some assistance we first tried the tourist office in Ieper, the staff were amazing, they found a possible hotel in Lille, phoned up, and managed to book us a room. We were sent on our way with good wishes. The next day we were dropped off in Lille centre, and very easily found the hotel, about 100 metres from the railway station, right next to one of the largest shopping malls that I have ever seen.

We greeted the receptionist with apologies for being there well before check in opened. It was about 11-30. He beamed broadly and said he was the man the tourist officer had spoken to! It was perfectly alright to come in, and we could go to the room immediately. We then settled in to wait. The following morning, we left our luggage in their store room, and occupied the first floor lounge area, ventured out only for food, and then, with the thousands of other passengers, duly caught our train. The car had been prebooked in the car park, but of course was 24 hours over limit. No problem said the female voice on the intercom, we quite understand, that will be an extra few euros, just present your card!

So why all this background?

As I have been reflecting today, the over-riding emotion I'm going to carry forward, is that of gratitude for the many kindnesses shown to us, as strangers.

I'm reminded that a random act of kindness is a non premeditated, inconsistent action designed to offer kindness towards the outside world. The phrase "random kindness and senseless acts of beauty" was written by Anne Herbert on a placemat in Sausalito, California in 1982. It was based on the phrase "random acts of violence and senseless acts of cruelty". Her book *Random Kindness and Senseless Acts of Beauty* was published in February 1993 speaking about true stories of acts of kindness. Which is what I'm going to pass on to others.

PS we visited the Menin Gate, as part of Martin's family folk lore was that his Great-Great Uncle's name was inscribed on one of the tablets. It was, we eventually found it among the 55,000 names of those who died between 1914-1918 with no known grave.

Dear Friends

"Thus far the Lord has helped us." 1 Samuel 7 v 12.

How do we begin to sum up the journey we have been on during the past 20yrs? With a degree of difficulty and a huge amount of gratitude!

The journey actually began more than 20 years ago, with a couple of years of prayerful planning, but it was in March 2003 that we three left the UK with a car and caravan, sailing across to France to learn French in preparation to work as nurse missionaries in Madagascar firstly, and then on to Tanzania. We were very naive, not realising that all the camp sites would be closed in a cold and wet March, but God led us to the Spring Harvest campsite, via lovely Christian friends, as they were preparing for their first season in France, and we worked there all summer, making many friends, earning enough money to live on and learning to trust God for the future. During that summer we bought our house in Martinet and in the September we enrolled in a French language school in Paris, for a term, (selling our caravan to pay the fees).

We then returned to Martinet, to renovate the house with the help of various friends and family, learning a lot of French along the way... mostly DIY terms, to be honest!.. but giving us confidence to speak a little more too. During the next months we were supported by a lovely group of villagers who helped us with our French acquisition and also by the little Baptist church in Chateau d'Olonne and the Anglican fellowship of All Saints Vendee. Spring Harvest at Le Pas Opton employed us on several occasions during our years in France, as well as giving us good friends who we are still in touch with today. Churches, Christian groups and individuals in the UK who supported us financially and prayerfully are too many to mention... and we would hate to leave anyone out..!

When we left France for Madagascar our mission organisation told us that we did not have enough monthly gifts promised to support ourselves, but we felt that the time was right and so continued on to Malagasy language school. At the end of that 6-month period we had the news that our target monthly sum had been reached... just as we were moving on to the hospital in Mandritsara which was to be the focus of our work. Gods timing was perfect. Since that time, in all our mission work, we were never without sufficient funds, either from generous donors (personal and church groups) or from work that we were able to do ourselves in both France and in the UK... all of which we see as Gods provision. Financial help has also been extended from our supporters, via us in situ, to various projects on the ground in both of the hospitals in Mandritsara in Madagascar and Berega in Tanzania. Student nurses have had some of their fees paid to enable them to continue their training, rainwater harvesting systems have been put in place, local churches have been helped, a special care baby unit has been equipped, many patients had their hospital fees paid via The Luka Fund, two retiring pastors have been given financial gifts to help them build a home for their retirement and a motor bike was bought to help in village evangelism. Many folks have cause to thank you for your generous help and support over these past years.

Both schools of nursing continue to run and many nurses have been trained for their local communities. We are in touch with many of our former students on social media and have had the privilege of visiting many of them in their new places of work. If you are interested, please ask for more details about work some of them are doing and inspirational stories of local solutions for local problems. The primary schools that Nel worked in are also both going from strength to strength.

During the past 20yrs we have also had spells back in the UK, supporting Mair's parents in their latter years and visiting Africa on several occasions for short supportive trips to do some teaching and encouraging. Nel, of course, has been an important part of our journey and has had a great influence in the work we undertook in both African villages. Bec and Hannah, their husbands and families, have also been unfailingly supportive and have had to sacrifice time with us in order for us to support others. We are indebted to them for their love and kindness to us.

Now our sojourn in France has come to an end. 20yrs since we left... March 17th 2003...we returned to the UK on March 13th 2023.

Many of you will know why we have relocated to the UK at this particular time, but some will not. Here is a brief outline of what has happened over the past three years in relation to Nel especially.

We all remember the Covid era with its lockdowns and many challenges to us all. Nel was working in an especially challenging environment, living-in with, and looking after, adults with severe learning disabilities... a job she loved and was very good at. During the many 'ordinary' lockdowns in Manchester her work also imposed more severe restrictions to protect their clients. Nel was therefore very much 'locked in'... not able to go out in-between shifts, so no shopping or football and no opportunity for 'external processing' which was very much her trade-mark. This led, in the months leading up to March 2021, to a period of severe anxiety and depression. She was hospitalised several times and this eventually led to her having to leave her job and move to Harrogate to live with Rebecca and her family for a while. Since that time she has moved into a flat which we have shared with her, on and off, and there has been significant improvement in her mental health, with two periods of employment locally (currently enjoying work at the local branch of Wetherspoons). We, John and Mair, have spent the past 2 years travelling backwards and forwards between Harrogate and our home in France, trying to maintain our residency there (complicated by all the post-Brexit challenges which did not exist when we first moved there) and supporting Nel as best we could. It has become obvious that this was not a permanent solution and so we have sold our home in France and are now on the cusp of buying a small house in Retford, coming full circle from 2003, as this is the town we lived close to before our departure! This will have enough room for Nel to live with us if she chooses, but we are continuing to look for somewhere for her to live independently but close to us. Retford is more or less equidistant from Bec and Hannah and their families, too, another important consideration.

There remain many challenges ahead, we are sure, but we are also sure that, with Gods help, we will be able to find a way of living with them and making our future years worthwhile and useful. When this period of change settles a bit, we hope to re-visit Africa and continue to support the previous projects, as and when we feel it is in their best interest. We also look forward to spending more time with our family and seeing some of you at some stage. Retford is just off the A1 and so if you travel north and south we will be a good stopping off point for a comfort break.



Something to chew on....

In the Nicene Creed we say we believe «in one holy catholic and apostolic Church». In this context, 'catholic' means 'universal', so that it encompasses not only the Roman Catholic Church, but also all truly Christian denominations.

Why is the universal church so divided? There are a few fundamental differences in the way the Scriptures are interpreted, but a lot of differences are actually cultural. Jesus replied: "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." Matthew 22 36-40
